

THE CASE OF THE MISSING WINDOW

The Benezette Williams house at 4380 Central Avenue was the epitome of elegant living when it was built back in 1888. The two-story, grand home featured extensive porches and several stained glass windows, including two matching arched ones. You can still see one of these windows on the front of the house today...but whatever happenend to its twin window?

My parents, Lawrence and Adriana Brannen, acquired the Benezette Williams home well over 50 years ago. I remember as a child going into the basement and seeing a very beautiful and bejeweled arched stained glass window sitting on a wood workbench.

Sometime in the early 1980s this arched stained glass window went missing, and we all wondered what could have happened to it. The family was distressed because it was such an integral part of the home. Nobody could account for its whereabouts – until one evening in 1987 when I received a mysterious phone call.

An anonymous female caller left a message on my answering machine stating she knew where our stained glass window was located! She left a man's name and address. I thought it was an odd message, maybe even a prank phone call, but something told me to investigate this potential lead on our beloved stained glass window.

I drove to the address and rang the doorbell. A man answered the door and I told him about a certain phone call I received from a woman instructing us that we could find our stained glass window at his home. He immediately



made some remark about his ex-wife and explained he had a stained glass window, but he purchased it.

I told him we had a lost stained glass window that belonged to our historical home in Western Springs, and that there were two such windows. And, if this was the one we thought it was, it would match its sister window.

He led me to his family room, and when I saw the window – even from a distance – I knew immediately it was "The One." The man had built his new family room addition around this beautiful stained glass window! It was the centerpiece. I told him this belonged to our home and asked how he acquired it. It was clear from his story that the description of the man who sold him the window was a former property manager who worked for our mother after our father passed away. He apparently sold it directly to this man who in turn, installed it in his home.

I demanded the window be returned immediately, and he replied he spent a lot of money on its restoration and framing. He wanted to be reimbursed for these incurred costs. While at his house, I saw two clear choices – not pay him and take him to court for purchasing stolen merchandise. Or, pay him for the money he had spent on restoration and take immediate possession of the window. I chose option #2 because we were anxious to get the window returned without delay.

Since that time the stained glass window has been hanging in our homes in LaGrange and in Indian Head Park. It's such an elegant and historic window. We'd like to share it with the Western Springs Historical Society so others can enjoy it too.

A LETTER FROM THE BOARD Saving the Past for Our Future

The mission of the Western Springs Historical Society is to instill an appreciation of the village's past in residents of all ages and to promote the preservation of the cultural, economic, and aesthetic heritage of our town. You may know us primarily through the Tower Museum on the Green in downtown Western Springs, but our work to fulfill this mission takes many forms.

In addition to the Tower Museum, we are also responsible for the Ekdahl House Museum on Wolf Road and an Archives office in the Grand Avenue Community Center. The Ekdahl House was built in 1887, only one year after the Village was incorporated. We maintain the house as an outdoor museum where visitors view the house as it existed in 1887 and explore the village's connection to 19th century issues such as immigration, the role of women, and the importance of community. Our Archives holds a vast collection of newspaper articles, pamphlets, photos and other materials relating to the people, places and events of Western Springs that is constantly being updated with new materials. While the Archives office is still closed to the public, we are answering queries via email at info@westernspringshistory.org.

Needless to say, all of these efforts rely on the support of volunteers. With the easing of pandemic restrictions, we have reopened the Tower Museum and anticipate the Archives office will reopen soon. As always, we are looking for volunteers to help keep these resources vibrant and up-to-date. Tower Museum Staff

The Tower Museum is open weekly on Saturday mornings from 10am to noon.

MUSEUM DOCENT: Each Saturday, two docents are responsible for opening the museum and greeting guests. The position can be as engaging as you wish — from interacting and teaching the guests about our exhibits to simply greeting guests if you are not comfortable with a lot of interaction. New docents will be teamed with an experience docent and training will be provided. **EXHIBITS DESIGNER:** This is the ideal position for someone with a flair for design and an interest in our village's history. The Exhibits Designer works with the Museum Manager to identify subjects for temporary or permanent exhibits, pulls together suitable artifacts from the collection, researches background information/ prepares text for the exhibit with help from the Archives volunteers, works with a graphic designer to format write ups, and installs the final exhibit. The designer also oversees the dismantling and storage of exhibits when they are taken down.

Archives Staff

Our Archives, located at the Grand Avenue Community Center, is open weekly on Tuesdays from 9am to noon.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT: Our

Archives Administrative Assistant is responsible for overseeing the activities at the Archives on Tuesday. Specific tasks include opening and closing the Archives each week, fielding calls/ emails from the public, overseeing activities of Archives volunteers, picking up/answering mail, keeping track of and purchasing supplies as needed, and interfacing with the Archives Manager. The Administrative Assistant can also participate as Preservationist, Cataloging Specialist and Researcher as needed or desired. CATALOGING SPECIALIST: This position includes the basic functions of the Preservationist, but requires the desire to learn additional archiving technical skills. Knowledge of PastPerfect software is helpful but not required. This position interfaces with other Archives staff, and direction is provided from the Administrative Assistant and the Archives Manager.

PRESERVATIONIST: Responsibilities includes recording acquisitions, cataloging existing and new artifacts, creating new digital formats of our vast collection of photos and documents. This position interfaces with other Archives staff, and direction is provided from the Administrative Assistant and the Archives Manager.

RESEARCHER: Beyond the internet, Researchers have access to our collection of documents and photos to create new historical content for newsletters, social media, exhibits and to answer ongoing public requests. This position interfaces with other Archive staff, Exhibit Designers, and direction is provided from the Administrative Assistant and the Archive Manager.
